31st March 2012 – Last Day at Reach

Today brings to an end something which began on a far-off Monday back in November 1995 when a nervous twenty-one year old, with an enviable salary of £8995, arrived for their first day's employment as an Administrator on the Compaq account. I remember thinking that this was a fortune - until I realised you had to pay tax!

Trying to condense 16 years into a few minutes is a little like trying to fit Niagara Falls into a milk jug.

I could talk for ages about people from the past that hardly anyone would ever have heard about. I could speak of former managers - the good, the bad and the ugly, (but Jonathon Beever isn't here!) but it would mean nothing to you. I could hark back to the halcyon days of Aspen Field Marketing and talk of Major Dick Festorazzi and the day email arrived in 1997. But I won't. Let's come a little more up to date...

I moved onto the Vodafone account in May 1999, some four months before I was due to be married. My final day in the office before my wedding also happened to be the day of the yearly Aspen Conference which was taking place up the road at the Runnymede Hotel.

Picture the scene, if you will, probably 200 people, including clients, seated in a room listening to various presentations. With the close proximity of my wedding to the conference date, someone had seen fit to add a slot into the agenda, presumably to break up the dull presentations, with a bit of light relief and present me with a wedding gift - a lovely gesture.

Those of us going over to Newbury now move on to another new chapter in the Vodafone adventure. The people who know me well realise that I don't enjoy change. Recently, I've had to come to terms with lots of changes, firstly in my personal life and latterly in my work life as well. I'm learning all the time. Sometimes, change can be a good thing in the long run.

What will I miss most about my time with Reach? That's an easy one to answer - the people! I have worked with some fantastic people over the years and they've made my time here simply the most fun imaginable. There are not many jobs where you look forward to coming to work each day, but this has been my experience here. I'd like to thank Reach, and particularly Gary, Katie and Colin for their loyalty and trust in me over the years too.

Just five individuals I'd like to pick out - Ben Duffy - Ben has been a great friend of mine since he joined the Vodafone account a few years back and we've been through a lot together. His knowledge of capital cities of the world as well as his unique hairstyle and fondness for male grooming products will linger long in my memory after I leave. I'll miss you mate.

Laura Peters - When she first joined, she immediately had to accept the nickname 'Henders' purely because she happened to occupy the desk previously used by Richard Henderson. We've had our differences over the years but there is no more loyal a friend you could ask for and sitting opposite her has been a privilege and a joy. Keep those tears back now!

The Ginger Boy - Stuart Herrington. What can I say? An absolute diamond. Stuart was one of the pioneers of the Woking Circuit - my daily walk around the shopping centres of Woking - and we've spent many happy hours plodding along just chatting - he never realised I only did it to try and help him shift some of those spare pounds! Joking aside, he's a very 'genuine' and funny person who has been a great mate over the years and I'm ever grateful for his wise counsel. Cheers matey!
